Americanism Awards Deadlines and Submission Requirements:

- 2) Provide details/examples about the activity as outlined in the 2017-2022 Programs Action Plan.

 - Deadline: June 1, 2020

- B. **Department Award:** Best Department Americanism Program (per division)
 - Deadline: June 1, 2020
 - Send to national division chairman postmarked or emailed by 5 p.m. EST on the deadline listed above.
- C. **Americanism Essay Contest**
 - 2019 – 2020 Theme: “How can we address the health and well-being of our veterans, military, and their families?”
 - All department entries must be sent by the department chairman to the national division chairman emailed or postmarked by April 15, 2020.

Americanism Reporting:

Mid-Year Reports

Mid-Year reports reflect the program work of units in the department and are intended as an opportunity for mid-year correction. Each department Americanism chairman is required to submit a narrative report by **January 5, 2020** to the division Americanism chairman, plus copy the national Americanism chairman.

Year-End Reports

Annual reports reflect the program work of units in the department and may result in a national award for participants if award requirements are met. Each department Americanism chairman is required to submit a narrative report by **May 15, 2020** to the division Americanism chairman, plus copy the national Americanism chairman. Members and units should follow their department's protocol and deadlines for report submissions at the department level.

Special 100th Anniversary History Program Facts:

Americanism: a term which became relevant in the late 19th century standing for allegiance to traditions. When the concept of Americanism was first used, nearly half of all Americans had not attended high school and many, being immigrants, did not speak English. Education came to the forefront to teach English, Americanism and Patriotism as well as to understand what our veterans had endured during the war. As the programs of The American Legion Family grew, so did the knowledge and feeling of Americanism and the U.S. Flag became our symbol of freedom and patriotism, known all over the world.
